June 14 Sunday (Fathers day is on the 21<sup>st</sup>)


July 19 Sunday

NADKC News Highlights

2009 Annual Meeting

The 2009 NADKC Annual Meeting was held on April 24-26, in Muskegon, Michigan, hosted by the Great Lakes Region. The Meeting held a flurry of activities not soon to be forgotten.

Thursday's seminars were held at NADKC Vice President Butch Grover's wonderful countryside place in Coopersville. Although the brisk morning air may have been the first to greet, it did not hamper the warm smiles of members and hand shakes of those whom had come from all over the country to participate. President, Rob Engelking, started with a seminar on breeding basics that he brought years of experience and practical knowledge to while the afternoon ended with a very informative session on force fetching basics by experienced trainer Doug Campeau.

Continuing on the following day, Friday's seminar was the completion of breeding information, and a conformation seminar using some of our four legged DK companions help. Following, was a short blood tracking example of a technique used by Rob Engelking. Everyone watched with interest as a young male DK successfully completed his first blood track. The excitement continued as more members arrived and greeted each other at the host hotel's parking lot, to the evening's dinner, and following Judge's Continuing Education seminar, the last event of the evening.

Saturday was a big day starting with a JGHV seminar in the morning following by the well anticipated Zuchtschau in which nearly 40 dogs were entered. # What are other organizations doing to train Versitile hunting dogs? Blood Tracking

Blood Tracking should be a requirement for a true Versatile Hunting Dog.

NAVHDA committee voted on a Blood Tracking motion on the last NAVHDA National Meeting. It didn't pass just by a few votes.

I've been involved with training my Deustch Kurzhaar Reni Erdmannshausen for blood tracking to pass the very difficult VGP test.

Being new to train for blood tracking I started gathering information from anyone that was familiar with it, I bought books, search on the Internet etc. etc.

Being very unfamiliar with this type of training, at the beginning I hated it at the end I loved it! Blood Tracking is the apex of a handler/dog teamwork

When your dog learn how to track blood, you need to learn how to read your dog.

Your dog is constantly telling you when he is on the track and when he lost it; you need to decipher his communication with you.

In testing your dog for blood tracking in the German system under the <u>Jagdgebrauchshund Verband</u> (JGHV, German Versatile Hunting Dogs Association) there is no allotted time for this test, the team handler/dog can take as long as needed to find the dead deer.

Judges can restart the team twice if it is more than 60 meters (198 ft) out of the track. With each restart you lose one point, the third time you are out of the VGP.

The dog is kept on a long tracking leash of which 19 ft must be always available to the dog. The dog should work it calmly, concentrated and confidently, excessive speed lowers the predicate.

After a successful work the dog will be left unleashed at the carcass with two judges hiding downwind so that the dog cannot see them. All other persons have to stay completely out of sight. After 5 minutes the handler can pick up is dog.

The handler can choose a Day Track or an Overnight track. In the Day Track the blood is laid down by the judges from 2 to 5 hours before the tests; in the Overnight track the blood is laid down at least 14 hours before the test.

There are other two types of ending the blood tracking that the handler can choose to gain more points: the Dead Game Baying (Totverbellen) and the Dead Game Guiding (Totverweisen). After the 400 meters of leash work the dog is unleashed, the Dead Game Bayer must stay at the carcass after he has found and must start barking to call his handler for at least 10 minutes.

After the 400 meters of leash work the Dead Game Guide must leave the carcass he has found in order to return to his handler and must lead his handler to the carcass in free guiding. Maximum achievable point scores:

Day Track: 112 with additional 16 points for the Bayer or 12 additional for the Guide Overnight Track: 124 with additional 16 points for the Bayer or 12 additional for the Guide.

At the successful end of the blood tracking there will be a traditional ceremony in which the judges congratulate the handler with two oak branches one for the dog collar and one for the handler hat. Reni Erdmannshausen ended with a 112 points for a perfect daytrack.

On next newsletter I'll let you know how I trained her.
